icide unit, assigned two more men to full-time duty on the case.

They are uniformed men well-acquainted with the Westside "who have a good rapport with kids" and who may pick up valuable information, Koers said.

**S T A T E P O L I C E** Capt. Robert K. Gray announced he was assigning a lieutenant to full-time administrative duty. Gray said the move would give him more time to work on the Bayles investigation, which he is heading.

The moves by Koers and Gray bring to more than 20 the number of men assigned full-time to the investigation.
